



Cultures of Remembrance

Breaking Cultural Barriers In and Outside the Classroom by Dr. Heather Meyer, Keynote Speaker

International schools have the very large task of establishing a sense of belonging for both internationally-mobile and host-country families. Yet, the strength of any institutional structure is the chance for its members to maintain a sense of belonging. By the end of this session, staff will have examined how institutional culture is reproduced and maintained at the Franconian International School and will have explored their individual roles in constructing FIS cultures.

The session will begin with a short presentation on the role of Culture on individual and community social imagination in schools. We will draw on ethnographic examples from Heather's own research at another international school in Germany to ground the theory that will be introduced.

Following this, we will break the session into 'teams' in which ideas will be collated about how Culture appears, is defined, and engaged with at Franconian International School. Sample themes include:

- FIS Culture and how it relates to other international schools (in Germany / globally)
- The role of teachers in reproducing FIS culture
- Cultural belonging and identity, and how this is facilitated at school
- The meaning and role of 'internationality', 'globality' and 'locality' at FIS

Following this, we will pool together these ideas and discuss – tying in best practice and resources for the everyday classroom.

Transitioning between Cultures: How does your Child Perceive their World?

The ways in which children perceive themselves (and others) in the world are influenced by a variety of spheres—the most important ones being their families and their educational institutions. This workshop aims to bring to discussion the role of Culture for children attending international schools, with a focus on the way in which it impacts social imagination and the effects it can have on mobility. Together, we will explore and discuss the ideas of international mobility (transitioning between schools/countries; adapting; repatriation), identity and belonging, and the role of the family throughout.
